


About the AIO

The American Institute of Organbuilders is an educational organization dedicated to advancing the art of organbuilding "by discussion, inquiry, research, experiment and other means." AIO members are professional organbuilders, service technicians, and suppliers who subscribe to the Institute's objectives and its Code of Ethics.

In 1973, a group of organbuilders met in Washington, D.C. to explore the possibility of forming a professional association. A provisional board was established and a constitution committee was appointed. In September of 1974, a convention was held in Dayton, Ohio, which adopted a constitution and bylaws, signed charter members and elected a board of directors. Since that time, conventions have been held each year in cities throughout the United States and Canada. These meetings are structured around a full schedule of technical lectures, visits to local organ shops and instruments, product exhibits and business meetings. The opportunity to meet other builders, technicians and suppliers for the purpose of sharing ideas and information is another important benefit of each convention.

The AIO midyear seminars provide further opportunities for professional growth. These weekend seminars are held in organ shops throughout the country and are structured to provide hands-on training in a variety of small group settings.

Journal of American Organbuilding

The Institute also publishes a quarterly journal featuring technical articles, product and book reviews, and a forum for the exchange of building and service information and techniques. Subscriptions are provided free to AIO members, and are available to non-members through the Houston office at \$12.00 per year, or \$32.00 for three years.

Membership

AIO membership is open to those currently engaged full time in organbuilding or organ maintenance work. Affiliate membership is open to those who are not full-time builders or technicians, as well as non-North American builders and those in allied professions supporting the pipe organ industry. Prospective members must obtain the nominating signature of a current AIO member and provide a brief summary of their work history on the nomination form. These forms may be requested from the Houston office, and they are also available at each convention. Further details about membership categories and annual dues are provided on the form.

Registering for the Convention

Please return the enclosed registration form and your check in U.S. Dollars (drawn on a U.S. Bank) by September 3, 1999, to receive the best registration rates. Instructions are on the registration form. This year's convention offers many interesting lectures and discussions, entertainment, and good fellowship. Special skills seminars will be held on Thursday, the day after the convention—please register for these on the back side of the form.

Registering at the Hilton Hotel

The downtown Hilton Hotel has been selected as the Convention site in Canton because of its convenient location and reasonable room rate of \$72 per night for singles or doubles. Hotel registration must be made by September 15 to receive the AIO's special convention rate. After that date, all subsequent reservations will be subject to availability and current hotel rack rates. Registration can be easily made directly with the hotel via the enclosed registration card. You may also register by calling the hotel directly at 330-454-5000.

Since the AIO must pay substantial penalties to the hotel if our anticipated block of rooms is not filled, it is in everyone's best interest to stay at the convention hotel.

Meals

Continental breakfasts, lunches, and dinners, except Tuesday evening, are included in the registration fee, beginning with the Sunday evening buffet and ending with the Wednesday evening banquet. Those with restricted diets should indicate their requirements on the enclosed registration form.

Ample time has been allowed for you to visit the exhibits of organ industry suppliers. Exhibitors' Nights have been planned on Sunday and Monday evenings. Exhibits are closed on Tuesday evening, and Wednesday morning will be your final opportunity to visit with the exhibitors.

Getting to Canton and the Hilton Hotel

Air and land travel to Canton is easy and convenient. Canton is located on I-77 midway between I-70 and I-80. Air travel is very handy through the Akron-Canton Regional Airport which is only twelve minutes from the hotel. The Hilton provides regular shuttle service to this airport.

Arriving by Car

From I-77, proceed on U.S. Route 30 East (East Liverpool Exit 104) to Cherry Ave./Downtown Exit. Turn right (north) on Cherry and go under the overpass and through the traffic light. Go over the bridge to 2nd Street. Turn left on 2nd and go two blocks to Market Avenue. Turn left on Market. The hotel is on the left and the parking garage is on the right. Garage parking is \$4 per day for hotel guests, with in/out privileges.


Arriving by Air to Akron-Canton

The airport is served by Continental, US Airways, Delta, Northwest, United, and Airtran. Upon arrival, call the Canton Hilton (454-5000) for shuttle service to the hotel. Driving time from the airport to the hotel is approximately twelve minutes.


Arriving by Air to Cleveland

Cleveland Hopkins airport is a major Continental hub and is also served by United and most other major airlines. There is regular shuttle service available to the Akron-Canton airport (a two-hour ride) and you can then transfer to the hotel shuttle. Other Cleveland shuttles are available for around \$50 per car, and all of the national car rental companies are available. Driving time from Cleveland is approximately one hour and fifteen minutes.

Matthew M. Bellocchio

Lecturer - "Time, Taste and the Organ Case-The Influence of Architectural Styles"

Matthew Bellocchio is a native of Brooklyn, New York, where he studied architecture at Pratt Institute and recieved a B.A. degree from St. Francis College. He started his organ building career while in college as a tuner/technician with the Louis F. Mohr Company in the Bronx, New York. During his twenty-five years at the Roche Organ Company in Taunton, Massachusetts, he designed and voiced over two dozen mechanical action instruments. He also supervised Roche's restorations of some of the oldest surviving instruments of E & G.G. Hook, Johnson, Steere, and Stevens. Matthew moved with his family to the Pacific Northwest in 1997 to become Production Manager at Marceau & Associates in Portland, Oregon. He is now Design Engineer at Bond Organ Builders, also in Portland. Matthew is a charter member of AIO and holds the Fellow certificate. He has served on the AIO board of directors and has lectured on mechanical key action design at two AIO conventions. He presently chairs the AIO education committee. Besides organbuilding and co-parenting, his other interests include antiques, architecture, gardening, stained glass and roller skating.

Panel Discussion - "The Electronic Tuner: Four Machines, Many Tips"

Ever since tuning his first organ by ear using only a single pitch fork, Mike Bigelow has been sold on electronic tuners. He notes that these tuners are especially valuable for unusual temperaments and cone-tuned pipes. "You'll save time, it's kinder to your patience, and gentler on the pipes. And even if you're slide tuning in equal temperament you'll save time and secure a more accurate tuning." Bigelow started his own shop in 1978 after working for six years in other organ shops. M. L. Bigelow & Co. in American Fork, Utah, employs eight people and is currently completing its twenty-sixth tracker instrument. Bigelow recently began a three-year term on the AIO board of directors.

Lecturer - "Marketing the Pipe Organ"

John-Paul Buzard began his company in 1982 and incorporated in 1985. While operating out of his basement and dining room, the Buzard Organ Company was one of the first small organbuilding companies to engage in a full-scale marketing campaign in the national organ journals, earning him immediate incredulity from his organbuilding colleagues. However, the campaign, and others which followed, produced name and product recognition and helped the growth of his company. John-Paul began his interest in music and organbuilding at age five, studying organ and piano throughout college and working with Chicago-area technicians during high school and early college. He holds a bachelor's degree in Radio-Television (with an emphasis in journalism and advertising) from the University of Illinois, and a master's degree in church music from Northwestern University. He has also earned the AIO Fellow certificate.

Panel Discussion - "The Electronic Tuner: Four Machines, Many Tips"




Mark Thewes


