About the AIO

The American Institute of Organbuilders is an educational organization whose objective is "to advance the science and practice of pipe organbuilding by discussion, inquiry, research, experiment and other means." AIO members are professional organbuilders or service technicians who subscribe to the objectives of the Institute and its Code of Ethics.

In 1973, a group of organbuilders met in Washington, D.C. to explore the possibility of a viable professional organization. A provisional board was established and a constitution committee was appointed. In September of 1974, a convention was held in Dayton, Ohio, which adopted a constitution and bylaws, signed charter members and elected a board of directors. Since that time, conventions have been held each year in cities throughout the United States and Canada. These meetings are structured around a full schedule of technical lectures, visits to local organ shops and instruments, product exhibits and business meetings. The opportunity to meet other builders, technicians and suppliers for the purpose of exchanging useful information is an important benefit of each convention.

AIO midyear seminars provide another valuable opportunity for professional growth. These weekend seminars are held at organ shops throughout the country and are structured to provide hands-on training in a small group setting. Unlike the annual conventions, seminar registration is open to AIO members only.

Journal of American Organbuilding

The Institute also publishes a quarterly journal featuring technical articles, product and book reviews, and a forum for the exchange of building and service information and techniques. Subscriptions are provided free to AIO members, and are available to non-members through the Houston office at \$12.00 per year, or \$32.00 for three years.

Membership

AIO membership is open to those currently engaged full time in organbuilding or organ maintenance work. Prospective members must obtain the nominating signature of a current AIO member and provide a brief summary of their work history on the nomination form. These forms may be requested from the Houston office, and they are also available at each convention. Further details about membership categories and annual dues are provided on the form.

Time

Pre-convention activities begin on Saturday, October 5, with the AIO Exam Review Session at 9:00 a.m., and the AIO Exams at 1:00 p.m. The official opening of the Convention is Monday, October 7 at 8:30 a.m.; the Convention closes with the Banquet on Wednesday evening, October 9. Restoration of the organ was completed in 1989 by Jan Van Daalen.



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
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
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J. Michael Barone
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J. Michael Barone is a graduate in Music History from the Oberlin Conservatory of Music, where his principal applied instrument was organ. He has been employed as Music Director of the Minnesota Public Radio Network since 1968. In addition to work on PIPEDREAMS, Barone is hostproducer of national broadcasts of the Saint Paul Chamber Orchestra concert season and MPR regional broadcasts of THE NEW RELEASES, a weekly program of music reviews. Barone has been recording organs and organ music professionally since 1969, both in the United States and Europe. He has participated as committee member and panelist in activities of the American Guild of Organists and the Organ Historical Society. For eleven years Barone was organist at First

Methodist Church in St. Cloud, Minnesota, but dropped regular performance activity to concentrate on PIPEDREAMS production. He still appears on occasion as a solo organ recitalist.



Gregory R. Bover Restoring Historic Organs

Gregory Bover began building musical instruments in 1975 with William Dowd, harpsichord maker, first in Cambridge and later in Paris. In 1978, he returned to the United States to work with Charles Fisk, starting with Opus 78 for House of Hope Presbyterian. He has worked on every Fisk organ built since then. During a leave of absence in 1983 he worked at Fuhrer Orgelbau in Wilhelmshaven, Germany, restoring the 18th century organs at Bockhorn and Loxstedt. On his return to C. B. Fisk he was named a Project Manager and shortly thereafter supervised the restoration of the small 1855 organ now at House of Hope. Mr. Bover shares responsibility for visual, structural and mechanical design as well as personnel and woodshop organization. He is married to harpsichordist and organist Frances Conover Fitch.



Russell C. Brown
Contract Law for Organbuilders

Russell C. Brown is a graduate of Carleton College, Northfield, Minnesota, where he received his Bachelor of Arts degree. He earned his Juris Doctorate at the University of Minnesota Law School. From 1968 to 1971 Mr. Brown served the State of Minnesota as a Special Assistant Attorney General and Assistant Attorney General. In 1971, he organized Stolpestad, Brown & Smith of St. Paul, which merged with Doherty, Rumble & Butler in 1985. Mr. Brown left that firm in 1987. He is now a member of the Minneapolis firm of Head, Hempel, Seifert & Vander Weide. Mr. Brown practices in the area of commercial litigation, including construction claims, real estate, surety and fidelity, and copyright and trademark law. He is a member of the American Arbitration Association panel of construction arbitrators.



Jesse Eschbach

"The House of Hope Merklin: 19th Century France Comes to Minnesota"

Jesse Eschbach, a member of the music faculty of University of North Texas, holds the degree of Doctor of Musical Arts from the University of Michigan, where he was a student of Robert Glasgow. His Bachelor's and Master's degrees are from Indiana University, where he was a student of Oswald Ragatz. His recent recording of Franck and Guilmant has been released on CD on the Centaur label. Along with organbuilder Gene Bedient, Dr. Eschbach is co-founder of the Summer Institute for French Organ Studies. He has appeared as a recitalist and lecturer throughout Europe and the United States and is increasingly respected for his interpretation of French organ literature.

John Ferguson
Church Organ Design for Today and Tomorrow

John Ferguson is Elliot and Klara Stockdal Johnson Professor of Organ and Church Music and Minister of Music to the student congregation at St. Olaf College, Northfield, Minnesota. Ferguson came to St. Olaf in 1983 from Minneapolis where he served Central Lutheran Church as music director and organist, an appointment accepted in 1978 after a fifteen-year tenure on the music faculty of Kent State University. He holds degrees from Oberlin College, Kent State and the Eastman School of Music where his doctoral study of organ was with Russell Saunders. Ferguson is the author of several books, served as the music editor of the United Church of Christ hymnal of 1975 and is a published composer. He is active in the American Guild of Organists and served as chair of that group's national convention in 1974.



Virginia Lee Fisk The Idea of Charles Fisk

Virginia Lee Fisk is President of C. B. Fisk, Inc. A graduate of Wellesley College, she joined the firm in 1978, first working as a voicer's assistant on the organ at House of Hope Presbyterian Church. She has served the company in various capacities, including that of business manager, and was named President upon the death of Charles Fisk, the founder of the firm. C. B. Fisk has built organs for churches, universities, and concert halls throughout the country. Their most recent project, Opus 100, is for the Dallas Symphony at the new Meyerson Symphony Center. Although the Dallas organ is massive in scale, the instrument at House of Hope remains the largest instrument to date built by the Fisk firm.



David W. KahnBuilding Quiet Organs

David Kahn is an acoustics consultant specializing in the field of architectural acoustics, in particular performance space design. He did his undergraduate work at Columbia University, and received his graduate degree from the Pennsylvania State University. After spending two years with Peter George and Associates, an architectural acoustics consulting firm, he joined the firm of Artec Consultants where he served as project manager and principal acoustics consultant for many of Artec's projects. David's most recent work includes serving as acoustics consultant to All Souls Unitarian Church in New York City. In addition to his practice in acoustics, he continues his active involvement in music as both listener and a trumpet player with groups

including the New York Symphonic Arts Ensemble, where he also serves as a member of the board.



Nancy Lancaster
The Idea of Charles Fisk

Nancy Lancaster is Organist and Coordinator of Music at The House of Hope Presbyterian Church in St. Paul, Minnesota. Since 1972 she has been an affiliate member of the music faculty at the University of Minnesota. Her undergraduate and graduate degrees are from the University of Oklahoma where her study was with Mildred Andrews. She has done further advanced study at Syracuse University, Indiana University, the University of Minnesota and the University of Salamanca (Spain). Her career has included full-time positions as a university organ teacher as well as positions in churches and recital activities. Mrs. Lancaster has served on the Executive Board of the Twin Cities Chapter of the American Guild of Organists and is Director of The

House of Hope Organ Institutes. She has performed extensively in the United States and throughout Great Britain and France.

Gerard Pels, a native of Alkmaar, the Netherlands, was born into an organbuilding family. His father, Bernard Pels, was associated with the firm of that name in Alkmaar; his mother, Cecile, with the firm D'Hondt in Herselt, Belgium. After completing high school, he briefly studied design at the Art Academy of Antwerp. His organbuilding experience includes apprentice work with his father at Pels-D'Hondt, with pipemaker Tim Koelewijn, and further work with Ferdinand Stemmer in Switzerland and Orgelbau Rensch in Germany. Gerard is Vice President of the International Society of Organbuilders, and serves as Editor of ISO publications.



Jon H. Thieszen

Documenting Shop Procedures

Jon Thieszen is design engineer for Dobson Pipe Organ Builders, Lake City, Iowa. He has been associated with the Dobson firm for 16 years. Jon received his Bachelor of Arts degree in organ performance in 1978 from Bethel College, North Newton, Kansas. For the past seven years he has been responsible for the engineering and construciton design of every organ the firm has built. As a minister's son, he grew up in South Dakota, Ohio, Kansas and Minnesota, and was exposed to organs and non-organs of varying degrees from an early age. Jon is a member of the American Institute of Organbuilders, the Organ Historical Society and the American Guild of Organists, and has served as Dean of the Buena Vista A.G.O. Chapter. In addition to his studies in music and

He has served in churches in Indiana, Ohio, Wisconsin and New York before coming to the Twin Cities and on the faculties of the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory and Earlham College in Richmond, Indiana. He is widely in demand as a recitalist and this year has played major programs in San Diego, Toronto, Phoenix, Madison, Miami, Philadelphia and New York and records for Columbia Special Products, a division of Sony Classical Recordings.
