



Convention Chairman

Phil Parkey is the President and Tonal Director of Parkey OrganBuilders, an organ building and restoration firm in the Atlanta area. A native of North Carolina, Mr. Parkey began his organ building career in 1983 while living in Asheville. He is a 1985 gradu-

Registering for the Convention

Please return the enclosed registration form and your check in U.S. Dollars (drawn on a U.S. bank) to the AIO registrar as soon as possible. Those mailing their forms before September 5 receive the "timely registration" discount.

Registering at the Sheraton Colony Square

The convention will be held at Midtown Atlanta's Sheraton Colony Square Hotel, 188 14th Street NE at Peachtree Street, Atlanta GA. It is located two blocks from the MARTA rail line Arts Center station. Rates are \$99 plus tax for singles and doubles. Hotel reservations must be made by September 12 to receive the special AIO convention rate. Rooms may not be available after that date. Reservations can easily be made directly with the hotel via the enclosed reservation form, or by calling the Sheraton reservation line at 1-800-422-7895. The hotel direct line is 404-892-6000 and the fax number is 404-733-6975.

Since the AIO must pay substantial penalties to the hotel if our anticipated block of rooms is not filled, it is in everyone's best interest to stay at the convention hotel and register as an AIO attendee at the \$99 convention rate. Rooms booked via the Internet cannot be counted as part of the AIO room block.

Post-Convention Tour

On Thursday, October 9, the post-convention tour will include six organs and a catered lunch at the scenic Callanwolde Fine Arts Center. Please register for this tour on the back of the registration form.

Tuesday Night AGO Hymn Festival

The Atlanta AGO chapter has invited convention attendees to be their honored guests at a reception, dinner and hymn festival on Tuesday evening. Register for this event on the back of the registration form.

Spouse Tour

A tour option is available on Monday, October 6. Included will be the CNN Studio tour, shopping, lunch at Mary Mac's Tea Room, and an afternoon at the Atlanta History Center. Registration for this tour is on the back of the registration form.

Smoking

Smoking is not permitted in the public areas of the hotel, nor in the convention exhibit, registration, and coffee break areas.

Meals

Continental breakfasts, lunches, and dinners, except Tuesday evening, are included in the registration fee, beginning with the Sunday evening dinner and ending with the Wednesday evening banquet. Those with restricted diets should indicate their requirements on the enclosed registration form.

Exhibits

Our exhibitors go to a great deal of effort to attend our conventions and we appreciate their substantial contribution to the success of AIO conventions. Ample time has been allowed for you to visit the exhibits of organ industry suppliers, beginning with the Saturday evening "preview." Exhibitors' Night is Sunday evening, beginning with a cash bar and dinner. The exhibits will be open for their final session for three hours on Wednesday morning.

Driving to the Sheraton Colony Square

The Sheraton Colony Square Hotel is located in Midtown Atlanta at 188 14th Street NE at Peachtree Street NE, just off of the I-75 / I-85 freeway at the 10th/14th Street exit. After exiting at 10th/14th (from either direction), turn east on 14th Street. The hotel is just past the fourth stoplight on the left hand side, at the corner of 14th and Peachtree Street.

For those traveling from the east or west on I-20, take the I-75 / I-85 North exit, then exit the freeway at 10/14th Street and follow the directions above.

Hotel Parking Fees

The Sheraton Colony Square Hotel parking lot charges \$16 per day for self parking and \$18 per day for valet parking.

Arriving by Air to Atlanta


Upon arrival, collect your bags in the baggage claim area and proceed up to either the MARTA rail station or the hotel shuttle pickup area. A \$2 MARTA token is the fastest alternative and involves a two-block walk to the hotel from the Arts Center station. Airport shuttle van tickets are \$17 round trip.

Arriving by Train

The Sheraton Colony Square is located at the corner of Peachtree Street NE and 14th Street, approximately one mile south of the Amtrak station. Taxi service is available. From the station, follow Peachtree Street south for approximately one mile and turn left onto 14th street. Turn left again into the Colony Square motor lobby.

October Weather in Atlanta

Weather conditions in October can be extremely variable. It is usually the driest month of the year for the city, with around three inches of rainfall. The temperature typically reaches daytime highs around 72° and evening lows around 52°.

American Institute of Organbuilders

About the AIO

The American Institute of Organbuilders is an educational organization dedicated to advancing the art of organbuilding "by discussion, inquiry, research, experiment and other means." AIO members are professional organbuilders, service technicians, and suppliers who subscribe to the Institute's objectives and its Code of Ethics.

In 1973, a group of organbuilders met in Washington, D.C. to explore the possibility of forming a professional association. A provisional board was established and a constitution committee was appointed. In September of 1974, a convention was held in Dayton, Ohio, which adopted a constitution and bylaws, signed charter members and elected a board of directors. Since that time, conventions have been held each year in cities throughout the United States and Canada. These meetings are structured around a full schedule of technical lectures, visits to local organ shops and instruments, product exhibits and business meetings. The opportunity to meet other builders, technicians and suppliers for the purpose of sharing ideas and information is another important benefit of each convention.

The AIO midyear seminars provide further opportunities for professional growth. These weekend seminars are held in organ shops throughout the country and are structured to provide hands-on training in a variety of small group settings.

Journal of American Organbuilding

The Institute also publishes a quarterly journal featuring technical articles, product and book reviews, and a forum for the exchange of building and service information and techniques. Subscriptions are provided free to AIO members, and are available to non-members through the Houston office at \$12.00 per year, or \$32.00 for three years.

Membership

AIO membership is open to those currently engaged full time in organbuilding or organ maintenance work. Affiliate membership is open to those who are not full-time builders or technicians, as well as non-North American builders and those in allied professions supporting the pipe organ industry. Prospective members must obtain the nominating signature of a current AIO member and provide a brief summary of their work history on the nomination form. Further details about membership categories and annual dues are provided on the form.

From the builder:

In planning an organ for the lecture hall of the Atlanta campus of Mercer University, we were faced with the double challenge of limited space and extremely dry acoustics. To give the instrument a distinct personal flavor that would be reasonably comfortable in this setting, we turned to the late 18th-century English chamber organs. Their somewhat "chamber-musical" sound seemed more appropriate than an aggressive Germanic or heavy Romantic sound.

The fifteen manual stops (twelve, discounting the bass stops) include an 8' Diapason, starting on low G, alluding to the traditional English G-compass. By providing a few stops that start only at tenor F and providing a common Stopt Diapason 8' for both manuals, it was easy to obtain a rich palette of tonal resources within a very limited space. The inclusion of no less than five (at least partial) ranks of wooden pipes—made from white pine, ash, and cherry according to the tonal requirements—helps this organ to make "sweet musicke" in a room that is not particularly kind to organs.

The knowledge and thoughtful advice of Dr. Robert Parris, University Organist of Mercer University, contributed much to the success of this organ.

Fred is Organist-Choirmaster of St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Canton, Ohio, and is an active member of the AGO. He has been a member of AIO since 1979, presenting lecture/demonstrations of organs at three AIO conventions, and currently serves on the AIO Board of Directors.



Jack M. Bethards

Holy Innocents Episcopal Church lecture/demonstration – "Contemporary Sight and Sound: Looking Forward and Backward"

Jack Bethards is President and Tonal Director of Schoenstein & Co. Organ Builders in San Francisco, the oldest and largest organ factory in the western states. A Bay Area native, he holds bachelor's and master's degrees from the University of California at Berkeley. In his 43 years of pipe organ work and research, he has been a frequent lecturer and contributor of articles to professional journals. A major thrust of his study, including work abroad, has been Romantic organ building in France, Germany, England and America. His organ design and restoration consulting clients include the Kennedy Center, the National Shrine and the Smithsonian Institution in Washington, D.C., the Boston Symphony Orchestra, the Cathedral of St. John the Divine, and the Riverside Church.



Herbert Buffington

Post-convention tour organist – Peachtree Christian Church demonstration

A native of Atlanta, Herbert Buffington has been organist and assistant choirmaster at Peachtree Christian Church since 1996. He received the Bachelor of Arts degree from Duke University and the Master of Music degree from The Peabody Institute of The Johns Hopkins University. European study was with Peter Planyavsky at St. Stephen's Cathedral in Vienna, Austria. He has presented concerts in the U.S. and Europe, and is also a composer of organ and choral works. One of his most recently published works was commissioned and recorded by duo-organists Elizabeth and Raymond Chenault. Buffington was formerly organist and choirmaster at the Decatur Presbyterian Church, an historic church known for its high level of musical excellence.





William F. Czelusniak

Lecturer - "Blinkin' and Puffin': The Mystery of Primary Actions"

Bill Czelusniak graduated *cum laude* in 1970 from Williston Academy, Easthampton, Massachusetts, including independent study of pipe organ design, construction, and tuning. Subsequently, he earned the Bachelor and Master of Science degrees in Business Administration from the University of Massachusetts, Amherst. During college years, Bill worked with several local organbuilders and, in 1971, established a business partnership with Francis E. Dugal for their service work in Northampton churches. In January 1978, the firm was chartered as Messrs. Czelusniak et Dugal, Inc., including Richard M. Frary, Jr. Bill led the firm through its first tracker renovation in 1979. The firm has since restored many organs of tracker, tubular- and electro-pneumatic actions, relocated a dozen pipe organs—some with significant redesign, has built two new instruments, and provides tuning and maintenance services throughout New England.



John Boody

Lecturer - "Making the Most of Wood Resources: A Strategy for the 21st Century"

A native of New England, John Boody attended the University of Maine in the School of Forestry for one year. A summer job with Fritz Noack in 1966 and 1967 made his career course inevitable. He was sent to Vietnam as infantry, and a lucky break landed him a job as chaplain's assistant (thirteen months of choir directing, typing the Sunday bulletin and re-voicing the G.I. Hammond and studying explicit government instructions as to how to blow the thing up in case of attack!). His next seven years were spent in Middletown, Ohio as a partner with John Brombaugh. In 1977 George Taylor, also a Brombaugh partner, and Boody started their own business. Together with their crew of fifteen, they have built over forty new instruments both here and in Japan. John's particular interest has been in wood technology and the sawmilling and drying of wood. He is a member of APOBA and the Allegheny Dry Kiln Club. He is an active choral singer, gardener and house renovator. Together with his wife Janet they enjoy 20 acres of farmland in the Shenandoah Valley.

Sarah Hawbecker

Organist - Lutheran Church of the Redeemer demonstration

Sarah Hawbecker is an active recitalist, full-time church musician, and winner of numerous competitions. Her performances have been recorded and broadcast on National Public Radio's program *Pipedreams*. She earned the Master of Music degree in Organ Performance from the Eastman School of Music and has served two terms as Dean of the Atlanta AGO chapter. She is an advisory board member of LPM Atlanta, the Leadership Program for Musicians sponsored jointly by the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America and the Episcopal Church. Ms. Hawbecker is Organist and Director of Music for Children and Youth at Lutheran Church of the Redeemer in Atlanta, where she oversees a program of two children's choirs, a family choir, three handbell choirs, a summer music camp, and a concert series. She also teaches organ and piano on the faculty of the Neighborhood Music Schools of Georgia State University.

Michael Morgan

Organist - Central Presbyterian Church demonstration

Michael Morgan, a Georgia native, is organist at Central Presbyterian Church in Atlanta, where he is now in his 27th year. A graduate of Florida State University, Michael did post-graduate study under composer Richard Purvis at Grace Cathedral in San Francisco. Michael has served on the staff of Presbyterian worship and music conferences and is an active member of the Atlanta AGO chapter. Among his interests are hymnology, especially Psalmody, and collecting rare English Bibles and Psalters. Recently his *Psalter for Christian Worship*, a complete collection of original metrical paraphrases of the Psalms, was published jointly by Witherspoon Press, Columbia Theological Seminary, and the Office of Theology and Worship (PCUSA). In addition to his duties at Central Church, he serves as Seminary Musician at Columbia Theological Seminary in Decatur, Georgia.



Patrick J. Murphy

Lecturer - "Minding Your Own Business"

Patrick Murphy is a New Jersey native who became interested in pipe organ construction and service work during his high school years. He received the first OHS E. Power Biggs Fellowship award in 1978, enabling his early exposure to the complete fabric of American organ construction and voicing. He received a bachelor's degree in organ performance from Ohio Wesleyan University in 1983 before continuing with further organbuilding apprenticeship work. He founded his own company, Patrick J. Murphy & Associates, in 1987. His shop now employs eight persons and produces both new construction and organ restorations in addition to organ service work in the Philadelphia area.



Fritz Noack

Mercer University lecture/demonstration - "Good Organs in Bad Rooms"

Fritz Noack was born in Germany in 1935. He began his apprenticeship with Rudolph von Beckerath and later he worked with Klaus Becker and Ahrend & Brunzema. After he came to the U.S. he worked with Charles Fisk for a year and organized The Noack Organ Company in 1960. To date, his firm has built 145 organs for churches, schools and private homes in most parts of the United States and Japan and Iceland. Noack's organs are influenced by his knowledge of historic organs of Europe and America as well as by his interest in the practical needs of musical performance. He has taught organ construction and the history of organ building at the New England Conservatory. The Noack Organ Co., Inc., is a member of APOBA and the International Society of Organ Builders, which elected Mr. Noack president in 2000.




John M. Nolte

He founded his own firm in 1986, and two sons, Benjamin and Jeremiah, joined the firm within the last three years. He spent two years at the Air Force Academy where he received POW training and flew faster than the speed of sound. He received a B.A. in mathematics from the University of Minnesota. In addition to his organ building, he served for seven years as a Lutheran pastor and has taught Latin, English, and composition at the high school level.

Todd Wilson


Sunday demonstration/recital - Sandy Springs United Methodist Church

















